Distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen,

It is an honor to address you today in the beautiful city of Córdoba to celebrate World Olive Day. I extend my heartfelt thanks to the Spanish Minister of Agriculture, the Córdoba authorities, and the International Olive Council for their warm welcome and today's activities.

As the EU representative, I am delighted to be here during the harvest season, as our farmers see their efforts rewarded after a year of dedication and care. The European Union is the world's leading producer, consumer, and exporter of olive oil, but our olive cultivation encompasses more than agriculture; it is integral to our cultural heritage and culinary traditions. It shapes landscapes, enriches the socio-economic fabric of Southern regions, and sustains vibrant rural communities.

I'm sure this is a sentiment we all share in this room, across the IOC membership. We all bear the responsibility to protect and preserve this ancient heritage.
